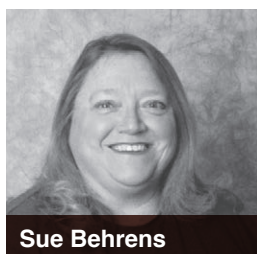

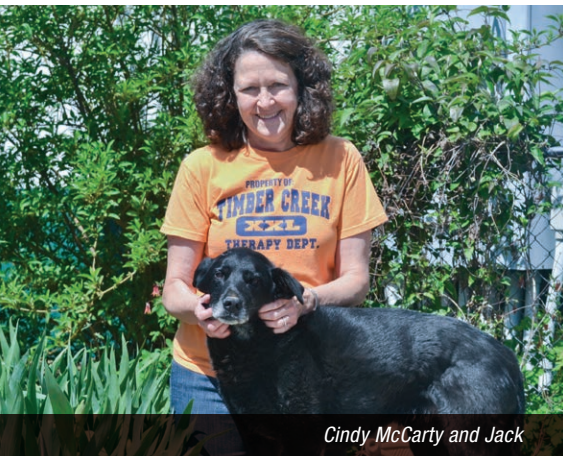

VARIETY GRANT

helps give children their voices

TANNER THORN

Jennifer Thorn knew something wasn't quite right. "Even at 12 to 18 months, I knew Tanner had some sort of delay because he wasn't babbling like his older brother had at that age," she says.

By the time Tanner was two, he began receiving speech services through the local area education agency, followed by three years in two developmental preschools. "We started to see some slow improvement in his speech, but testing showed both his short-term and long-term memory was low, so his ability to retain information was below normal," Jennifer says.

The next step was an expensive, private school in Des Moines, without much progress. Jennifer and her husband Todd, who live in Panora, had heard from others that Timber Creek might be able to help Tanner. He started speech therapy here in early 2011.

Riding a horse stimulates Tanner's spinal column and brain. That makes it a good time for his speech therapist, Cindy McCarty, to work with him on memory,

paying attention, making eye contact and sentence structure. The work is paying off.

"The increase in his memory is huge. And his vocabulary has expanded tremendously," Jennifer says. "He used to use pronouns incorrectly, or leave them out completely. Now he talks in full sentences and he makes eye contact."

Jennifer says the reason for Tanner's problems were never diagnosed, although she thinks it may have been a brief lack of oxygen at birth. But Tanner, who now is eight, is doing well in school and improving daily. "I just can't say enough good things about Timber Creek," she says. "The way everyone here interacts with the patients is just fabulous. It's obvious they really care."

Variety—The Children's Charity of Iowa is dedicated to improving the lives of Iowa children. In 2011, and for the fifth year in a row, Variety provided \$10,000 to Timber Creek Charities. Here are the stories of three children who have been helped at Timber Creek Therapies because of the Variety grant.

KEVIN & RACHEL COGIL

Eight-year-old twins Kevin and Rachel Cogil have been coming to Timber Creek for more than five years. Kevin was the first to begin treatment here, after an autism diagnosis at the age of three.

"He had learned 10 to 12 words before he began to regress," says Roxanne Cogil. She and her husband Craig are raising their four children south of Jamaica. "Kevin became completely nonverbal so the only way he could communicate was through behaviors."

Because Kevin was nonverbal by the time he came to Timber Creek, therapists here worked with him using pictures and sign language. Once Kevin learned to associate meaning with language, his behaviors began to decrease.

As therapy continued, Kevin began to speak again. "It took a while for him to get going, but once his words started to come, he made amazing progress," Roxanne says. "Now Cindy works with him while he's on horseback with speech therapy and social skills. He's doing well in school and generalizing his skills."

Just a couple of months after Kevin began treatment at Timber Creek Therapies, Rachel also began speech therapy sessions here. Her speech was delayed but

for her, the problem was seizures that began when she was two-and-a-half years old.

"The seizures would wipe her out for hours, and caused short-term memory loss. She was on four different medications, which put her in a fog much of the time," says Roxanne. "An MRI showed she had abnormal white matter lesions throughout the right half of her brain. Doctors believed she had Rasmussen's Encephalitis, a rare, progressive brain disease that usually affects only one hemisphere of the brain."

There is no cure, but with this diagnosis, the best chance for quality of life is removing half of the brain. In March 2009, after fighting the seizures for three years, the right side of Rachel's brain was removed during surgery at the UCLA Medical Center. She spent two months there, followed by another two months of inpatient rehabilitation at ChildServe in Johnston.

The left side of Rachel's brain took over the commands that were previously from the right side. She lost all motor skills on the left side of her body and had to relearn everything.

Rachel hasn't had a seizure since the surgery. Once she was able to come home, she returned to Timber Creek for both physical

and speech therapy. "The hydrotherapy pool did wonders helping her regain movement," Roxanne says.

While she no longer gets physical therapy at Timber Creek, she does continue working with Cindy McCarty during speech therapy sessions in the riding arena. "Her language has blossomed. The therapy has really helped with her expressive language, listening skills and social communication."

"The help Kevin and Rachel have received here has been excellent," Roxanne says. "They continue to make gains. We are so fortunate to have Timber Creek Therapies here in Guthrie County."

HONOR THREE FRIENDS OF TIMBER CREEK

People often donate money to a favorite charity in memory of a loved one. Over the last 10 years, more than \$15,000 in memorial gifts has been given to Timber Creek Charities.

Within a three-month period, three men with strong ties to Timber Creek passed away with Timber Creek Charities named as a charity of choice for those who wanted to make a donation in their honor. Here are their stories.

Roger McCarty

Roger McCarty was born in Guthrie Center in 1930 and died Nov. 15, 2011. He spent his early years farming with his father and two brothers. In 1955, after four years in the U.S. Navy, Roger began a career in the insurance industry as an agent with State Farm Mutual Insurance Company in Denver, Colorado.

Roger soon formed his own company, which eventually became Brokers International, Ltd. The company moved from Colorado to Panora in 1999, bringing Roger back to his Guthrie County roots. Brokers International, Ltd., is one of the nation's largest and longest standing insurance marketing organizations. It is an independently owned and family-operated organization.

Roger's nephew, Bill McCarty, is the company president. Bill is married to Cindy McCarty, the founder and director of Timber Creek Therapies at Guthrie Center.

Roger and his wife Jane were strong supporters of Timber Creek since its beginnings in 2001.

Brokers International, Ltd., was one of the original sponsors of the Timber Creek Charities annual golf tournament, with a 10-year total of \$43,000 in contributions. Roger often was a significant bidder during the fundraising auction held each year after the golf tournament.

Roger, who battled cancer for a couple of years, talked with Cindy after his diagnosis, telling her how rewarding it must be to help people at Timber Creek Therapies.

Just weeks before his death, he and Jane made a personal \$25,000 contribution to Timber Creek Charities. After his death, Cindy learned they had decided to suggest memorial contributions be directed to Timber Creek.

More than **\$37,000** was donated to Timber Creek Charities in Roger McCarty's memory.

Enrique “Rick” Almirall

Enrique “Rick” Almirall was born in 1915 in Jamaica British West Indies and died Dec. 15, 2011. His wife of 56 years, Imogene, was Roger McCarty’s sister.

That makes his daughter, Rita Bergman, a cousin and cousin-in-law to Bill and Cindy McCarty. Rita also is a member of the Timber Creek Charities board of directors. She and her husband, William Bergman, live in Keystone, Colorado.

“Dad was familiar with Timber Creek and attended the very first dedication ceremony in the fall of 2001,” says Rita. “My first husband, Don Gillespie, was influential in encouraging Cindy to pursue her dream of starting Timber Creek. Dad was aware of this, and chose Timber Creek as his charity of choice.”

Rita says her husband Don was the first person to select Timber Creek as his memorial charity of choice, so when he died in August 2001, all memorial money was donated to Timber Creek Charities.

“Timber Creek wasn’t yet completely operational, just in its infancy. Cindy honored Don by dedicating the riding arena to him and a sign hangs there in his honor,” Rita says. “My father was very touched by Cindy’s generous acknowledgment of Don’s inspirational influence.”

“We both felt it was a means for Don to ‘live on’ and inspire others with his example of courage and integrity,” Rita says. “Cindy has told me many clients ask who Don Gillespie was. She is able to tell his story again and again. It means the world to me, and my father knew this.”

More than **\$1,300** was donated to Timber Creek Charities in Enrique Almirall’s memory.

Carroll Junior Washburn

Carroll Junior Washburn was born in 1924 in Guthrie Center and died Jan. 4, 2012. He lived in four houses within a half-mile of his birth for 87 years. He and his wife, Marilyn, raised four children.

Marilyn Washburn was a teacher in the Guthrie Center schools and had Cindy McCarty as a student. One of Carroll and Marilyn’s sons, Jim, was a childhood friend of Cindy’s.

Jim graduated from Iowa State University with a degree in construction engineering and moved to California. He now is the innovation manager for DPR Construction, Inc.

When Cindy was designing the Timber Creek Therapies building, Jim helped with the floor plan, connected her with an Iowa architect and offered advice. In eight different years, Jim has secured \$3,000 grants from DPR Construction for Timber Creek Charities.

The entire Washburn family followed the development of Timber Creek, providing both encouragement and financial support. Marilyn is well known for the stained glass items she donates each year for the auction that follows the golf tournament.

“I have seen and heard about the miracles accomplished at Timber Creek and want to see it possible for more patients to go there for help,” Marilyn says. “After Junior died, we thought Timber Creek might benefit if we named it as a charity for his memorial gifts.”

More than **\$1,400** was donated to Timber Creek Charities in Carroll Junior Washburn’s memory.



10th Annual **GOLF TOURNAMENT** BEST EVER

The 10th annual Timber Creek Charities golf tournament held July 16 at Lake Panorama National proved to be the best yet, with about **\$45,000** raised. Five corporate sponsors provided a total of **\$19,000**.

BROKERS INTERNATIONAL, LTD., has been an annual sponsor since the first tournament in 2002. That company donated **\$5,000** in 2011, bringing its 10-year total to **\$43,000**.

AMERICAN EQUITY also has been an annual donor since 2002. The company donated **\$2,000** in 2011, for a 10-year total of **\$35,500**.

AVIVA, formerly AmerUs, became a major sponsor in 2005. The company's **\$5,000** donation in 2011 brings its total to **\$31,000**.

AMERICAN RETIREMENT SYSTEMS and its founder Kevin Wingert, who serves on the Timber Creek Charities board of directors, has been a sponsor since 2009. A **\$5,000** donation in 2011 brings Wingert's contributions in support of the golf tournament to **\$13,500**.

GREAT AMERICAN LIFE INSURANCE was added in 2010 as a new corporate sponsor with a **\$2,000** donation, and supported the tournament with another **\$2,000** donation in 2011.

More than **\$1,600** was raised through the sale of mulligans, a guessing game, and a "beat the pro" contest. John Dinnebier, Lake Panorama National general manager and director of golf, sold his shots on a par-3 hole for \$20 with all proceeds going to Timber Creek Charities.

There were 32 four-person teams in the best-ball tournament. A total of 32 companies and individuals donated \$100 each as tee box sponsors.

Golfers participated by paying \$75 each for lunch, golf, prizes and dinner. Another 40 supporters, including Timber Creek patients and their families, attended the dinner.

After dinner, guest speakers included Jim Stafford, representing the Timber Creek Charities board of directors; LeRoy Oxley, a long-time volunteer at Timber Creek; Allen Neal and his daughter,

Sydney, a Timber Creek patient; and Sue Behrens, lead physical therapist at Timber Creek who has played a key role here since its founding.

The year's activities were highlighted in a slide show. A charity auction followed, netting nearly \$12,500.

A bonus to the money raised during the tournament was \$2,225 that came into Timber Creek as individual donations in response to letters soliciting golf teams and sponsors.

EMPLOYEES MAKE FUNDRAISING FUN

Each year, employees at the Brokers International, Ltd., campus on the east edge of Panora choose three charities to support. In 2011, Timber Creek Charities was a top vote-getter when employees were asked to vote on a list of possible charities.

A fundraising committee coordinates the process to determine the charities. Smaller groups lead fundraising efforts with each charity in the spotlight for a period of three months.

Rhonda Scott, along with Emi McCarty, Marcia Hackfort and Wanda Bates, coordinated the Timber Creek Charities fundraising effort. Scott says a presentation to employees by Timber Creek founder Cindy McCarty made a difference.

"Cindy's presentation really opened people's eyes to what a wonderful organization Timber Creek is and what great things they do for people," Scott says. "It helped us realize it's a good cause. It also helped that this is a local charity."

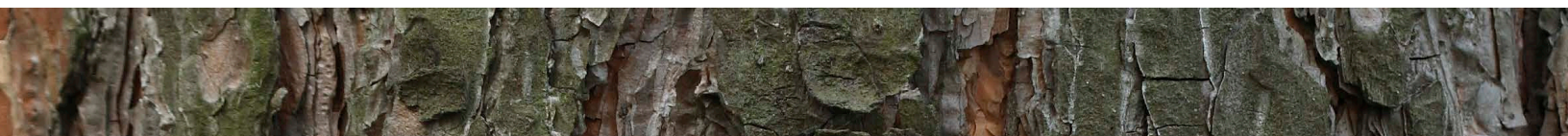
A monthly activity to raise money was conducted. The most popular was employees purchasing a "casual day." Those donating were given a sticker to wear on a designated day, along with casual attire.

Another month, they worked with the Red Wheel Fundraising Company. In the fundraising business since 1982, Red Wheel is the industry's largest manufacturer of frozen food for fundraisers.

Employees received flyers on the more than 50 fundraising food products offered through Red Wheel, and were asked to purchase items, plus share the flyer with family and friends.

Rhonda Scott's husband, Don, made the third activity possible. He owns the Redfield Locker so offered a variety of specialty meat products at cost, with proceeds above cost going toward the Timber Creek donation.

The three fundraising efforts brought in a grand total of \$2,643 for Timber Creek Charities in 2011. Brokers International, Ltd., employees have voted to again support Timber Creek in 2012.

PANORA CHURCH DONATES TO "MISSION IN OUR OWN BACKYARD"

Angie Laabs of Panora was the picture of health. But in March 2008, a bout with the flu had her vomiting so hard she tore a carotid artery. A blood clot formed and she suffered a stroke.

After 12 days in intensive care, Angie emerged completely paralyzed on her right side. She also had severe aphasia, a disorder that results from damage to portions of the brain that are responsible for communication. She arrived at the Younkers Rehabilitation Center in Des Moines in a wheelchair, unable to talk.

Lana Laabs of Jamaica is Angie's mother. "She had to relearn her ABCs, the days of week, how to count, the difference between up and down and so much more," Lana says.

After six weeks at Younkers, Angie was able to walk about 200 feet, but used her wheelchair much of the time. And her communication skills still were limited.

"When we came to Timber Creek in May 2008, the horse riding was a real plus for Angie," says Lana. "Cindy got her on the horse and in the pool immediately for both speech and physical therapy. We could see a real difference within two weeks."

Fast forward three years. Angie and her parents, Lana and Mike, are members of the Fountain of Life Church, located a mile south of Panora on Wagon Road. During a Sunday service, Pastor Randy Leib was talking about the many missions the church supports, mostly in foreign countries.

"I got to thinking we have a mission in our own backyard—Timber Creek," Lana says. "There is a great need for people to receive the therapy services available there, but many don't have insurance and can't afford it, or their insurance doesn't cover all the therapy they need. So much hope and healing takes place at Timber Creek, and I thought it would be a great thing for our missions money to support."

Lana talked to Pastor Leib about the possibility of giving some of the church members' money that had been designated for mission work to Timber Creek Charities. He talked with the board and within two weeks, she had a check for \$500, which she presented at the banquet following the 2011 golf tournament.

A few months later, another \$500 check came from the Fountain of Life Church, for a total donation of \$1,000 in 2011. Lana says church members are supportive because they've seen how much Angie continues to progress with ongoing therapy at Timber Creek.

Angie has received assistance from Timber Creek Charities when she reached the maximum number of therapy sessions her insurance would cover each year. The charity also has covered Angie's therapeutic riding sessions, which are not covered by insurance.

"I just can't say enough good things about Timber Creek," says Lana. "It has been such a blessing to us. We call it heaven on earth."

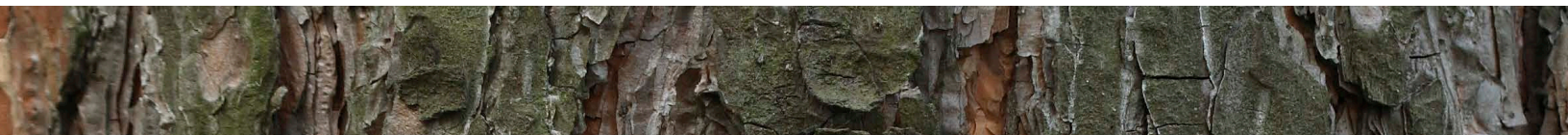

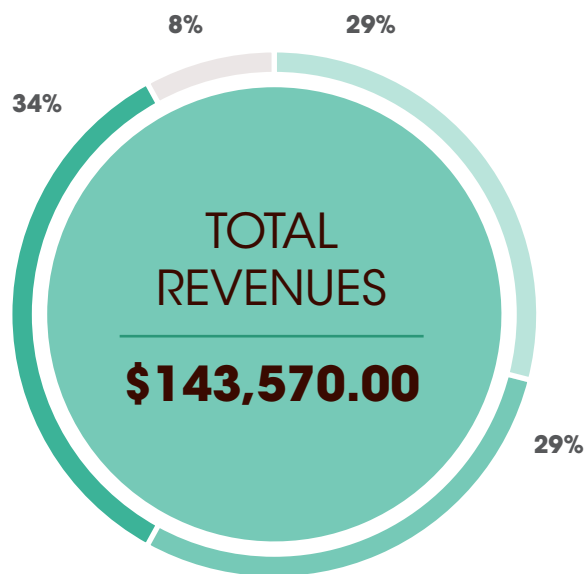

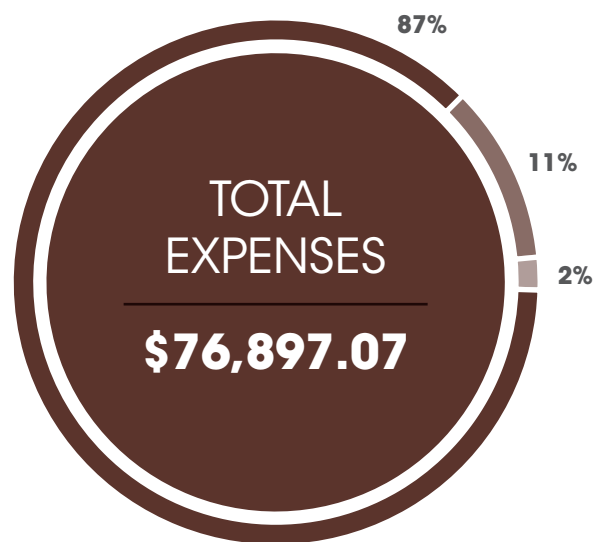
